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Fascinating Finds

Like most, I was introduced to coin collecting at an early age by relatives. My aunt and uncle gave me a Mercury dime folder that was about half complete for Christmas one year. I was fascinated by those odd looking dimes. A few years passed by and my interest in coins begin to fade.

Later in life, the collecting bug hit me again and I made my first purchase from a coin shop. I enjoy reading and learning about all different kinds of coins, but I mainly pursue coins that are visually appealing to me.

One day I'm browsing at the local coin shop and I spot a little 3-cent silver piece in an old, 2nd generation, PCGS holder. It was a common-date and graded either MS62 or MS63; not exactly in my price range.

The coin was beautifully toned with vibrant blues and purple that intensified around the edges; a lot going for such a small little coin. I managed to resist its appeal and get out the door that day without purchasing it.

As was my routine, I continued to drop by the coin shop every week or two to say hello and check out any new inventory; mainly browsing and enjoying all those incredible works of art hammered into those little metal disks. Occasionally, I would find a coin that fit into my small collection and my price range. However, I always made time to admire that little 3-cent piece.

Congress has approved a redesign of the Sacagawea dollar in hopes that consumers and business will embrace the gold-colored dollar. Legislation has been sent to President Bush for his signature. The new version will continue to depict Sacagawea and her child on the obverse, but the reverse will feature scenes that change annually commemorating the achievements of other American Indians and tribes. First minted in 2000, the Sacagawea replaced the Susan B. Anthony dollar. Both dollar coins failed to win public acceptance. Today the Sacagawea dollar is only produced for sale to collectors.
