Digging History

Kyle Wright and Jeff Youkey from the Smith County Metal Detecting Association were the special guest speakers at the February meeting. Kyle presented information about the metal detecting club including their monthly meetings and special club events like their seeded hunts. They also hold seminars on a regular basis to help newcomers learn how to use equipment. Kyle discussed how current laws impact the hobby. He also gave a few pointers about obtaining permission from land owners

They brought a fantastic collection of finds. One display featured civil war bullets and buttons. Two of the buttons were found at Camp Ford and another in Canton, TX. There was also a collection of suspension badges. Suspension badges are usually inscribed with dates and honor big events from the past. Examples included an 1895, Texas Fruit Palace badge, an 1899 badge honoring the unveiling of a Civil War monument, and a 1910 volunteer fire department carnival with a engraving of a horse drawn fire carriage.

The collection also included old coins, trade tokens, love tokens and rings. Most of the coins were found in Smith and Henderson County. There was an 1828 Capped Bust half dollar and a very nice 1919-D Standing Liberty Quarter.

Kyle got into the metal detecting hobby about nine years ago. Kyle is president of the Smith County Metal Detecting Association and Jeff Youkey is vice president. If Jeff looked familiar to you, it may be that you've been in his place of business; the Jewelry and Coin Exchange located in Tyler. Jeff is also a licensed reseller of Fisher metal detectors.

Owning a metal detector is not a requirement to join the Smith County Metal Detecting Association. In fact, people often join and use the information shared in their meetings and events to help determine the best equipment for their needs before purchasing.



News Bytes

On January 22nd, the U.S. Mint opened sales of the 2009 Ultra high Relief Double Eagle Gold coin. The 24-kt one-ounce gold coin is a digitally reproduced version of sculptor Augustus Saint-Gaudens ultra high relief 1907 Double Eagle Liberty gold piece which was never released into circulation.

On February 12th, the U.S. Mint released into circulation the first redesigned Lincoln cent in 50 years. The new cent features a log cabin on the reverse side of the coin, emblematic of Lincoln's humble roots in Kentucky.

On February 26th, House Resolution (HR) 1209: Medal of Honor Commemorative Coin Act of 2009 was introduced in the House of Representatives. If the legislation passes, it would require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint commemorative coins in 2011 in recognition and celebration of the establishment of the Medal of Honor in 1861. The Medal of Honor is America's highest award for valor in action against an enemy force that can be bestowed upon an individual serving in the Armed Services of the United States.

The American Numismatic Association's 86th Annual National Coin Week is April 19-25. Lincoln's Legacy: A Nation United is this year's theme celebrating the 200th anniversary of Lincoln's birth, and his role in history and numismatics.

The United States Mint has temporarily disabled the *Track My Order* feature on their website due to security concerns. Online customers must call the Mint's 1-800 number to inquire about the status of an order until the feature is made available again. Although the Mint has remained quite on the subject, problems ordering the new Ultra-High Relief gold eagle seem to coincide with a change in the Mint's fulfillment contractor.
