

NUMISMATIC BIOGRAPHY

(Larry Vann)



I began collecting coins at around 10 years of age. This came about due to a search of my family's small library in which I found a Yeoman's Red Book. As no one in my family was interested in collecting coins for any reason other than spending (or saving), the book had been planted in the library along with some Cub Scouting material which was of family interest at the time. When I saw the coins of days gone by priced, I was amazed that such relics were available to acquire. Wow!

I received some coins from grandparents and parents (primarily foreign coins brought back from the world wars). The first coin I purchased was a large cent from the 1850's at a local general hobby shop.

My first attempt at a "set collection" from pocket change was the 1941 to date Lincoln Cents. I never did fill that book.

I won an uncirculated 1881-S silver dollar playing horseshoes at a baseball club cook-out when I was 12 years old – and used it to give my first Show-n-Tell, at school, shortly thereafter.

Coin collecting during high school years is kind of fuzzy - like most everything else during that time period.

I worked part-time for a local dealer while in college in Beaumont, Texas. The dealer's name was Pat Mounier – from China, Texas. He dealt mostly in foreign coins and he taught me the general points of grading coins. Pat fell off the radar screen some time after 1980. I'm not sure what became of him.

During my working life I faded in and out of the coin collecting hobby. I did help a friend with the start-up of a coin shop in the mid-1980's. His name was Paul Edwards. Paul and I sponsored a coin Show in Lake Jackson about that time. The dealers were all happy with the outcome – but Paul and I lost our shirts and could not afford another show.

I started a coin club in Lake Jackson in the early 1990s. We lasted only a few years. We met at the local library for free. The members were very loyal in attending meetings, but not very active otherwise. We had a good time while it lasted. During this time I was also a member of the Pasadena Coin Club and, to a lesser extent, the Houston Coin Club.

I taught a non-credit course on coin collecting at the local junior college one year. What I remember is that it was a lot of hard work for one person to put together and carry out and that we had about 15 people attend.

I have retired and moved to Arkansas. I have collected type coins, US and foreign, for many years now. As I believe I have all the coins I need (small in number), I now work on trying to figure out how to make the hobby interesting for others.

I have been a life member of the ANA for many years. I am a year-to-year member of the TNA. I am currently an active member of the Tyler, Longview, and Texarkana Texas coin clubs and also the Central Arkansas Coin Club in Little Rock. *I love my hobby*.

Last, but by no means least, I am thankful that my clubs have a Christian base within them and their leadership.
