Roger G., of the Central Arkansas Coin Club reminds us to consider large cents in our answer to the riddle. The Flowing Hair and Chain Cents were only minted in 1793 with just 99,456 of the Flowing Hair variety struck and 36,103 of the Chain Cents.

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FYI

In putting together an exhibit regarding hard monies used in the Republic of Texas, I ran across an interesting piece of information I had no clue about. When discussing the use of early Mexican Cap and Ray 8 reales with "H. T.", of Ft. Worth's Mike Dunigan Coins, he mentioned he had visited the building in which the Republic of Texas had an embassy – in Paris, France.

That's right. As it turns out, the French opened a legation in Austin, (a few miles from the site of the current Texas Capital building) in 1841, and Texas in turn opened an embassy in Paris, France.

CHECK THIS OUT

In going through a stack of foreign currency, I ran across an old check from the Philippine Islands during the period in which the United States had a heavy interest. The check was written August 8, 1907. It is a check for twenty (20) dollars made out to a Thomas Calapardo and written by a George Kearney. It is stamped as a payment for maintenance, salaries, and wages. It is endorsed by Thomas, so it was cashed. I couldn't find out more about the men, so I'll leave that to you – my readers.

What I next looked into was what was happening in the Philippines during this time period.

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	Parto the order of Tomas Calapardo
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In July 1907 the first Philippine Assembly elections were held. Remember the U.S. was in possession of the Islands and had just put down an insurrection intended to throw off it's yoke of colonial rule. This assembly might be considered the first step in Philippine independence via a peaceful route.

On September 13, 1907, Macario Sakay was executed in Manila. Sakay was a Filipino general who took part in the 1896 Philippine revolution against the Spanish Empire and in the Philippine-American War. After the war was declared over by the United States in 1902, Sakay continued resistance by leading guerilla raids that lasted for several years.



Sakay, believing that the formation of the national assembly was the first step toward a peaceful Filipino independence, surrendered to U.S. authorities on July 14, 1906, At his trial, he was accused of "bandolerismo", which interpreted all acts of armed resistance to American rule as banditry. Sakay was convicted and sentenced to death by hanging. His last words: "Long live the Republic."
