

NO MORE LINCOLN CENTS BEING MINTED FOR CIRCULATION

On Wednesday, November 12th, the U.S. Treasury Department minted the last Lincoln one cent coin for circulation when Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent ceremonially struck the final Lincoln cent, ending the 232 years of one cent coins in America.

The cost to produce a Lincoln cent is approximately 3.7¢, and, last February, President Trump ordered the Secretary of the Treasury to end this waste.

Last year, Lincoln cents were 57% of the 5.61 billion minted circulating coins, and halting cent production is supposed to save \$56,000,000 annually in costs. There's no concern about a shortage of Lincoln cents as the Treasury estimates 300 billion of them are currently in circulation, each circulating for an average of 30 years. Of course, the government doesn't consider the number of coins stashed away by numismatists.

Some speculate that the final Lincoln cents minted on November 12 will sell for outrageous sums of money...not without a signed affidavit by Secretary Bessent himself. Otherwise, there may be a few "last coin minted" on the Tyler Coin Club auction tables.

TEASER from NOVEMBER 2025 NEWSLETTER

What may not have been apparent from last month's teaser, and should now be apparent with the third coin above, is that this a 1905-O "Micro O" Barber dime. The Micro O was created when a die sinker used a mintmark punch that was intended for a quarter dollar which, ironically, is smaller than that used on the dimes during that era. For those who may be wondering why the quarter dollar would have the smaller mintmark, it is because there was very little space on the reverse of the quarter dollar between the eagle's tail and the 'R' of 'QUARTER'. According to Walter Breen, this variety was discovered by Howard Newcomb circa 1912 (interestingly, that is the same Howard Newcomb known for his reference work on die varieties of 1816 – 1857 large cents).

This is a relatively scarce variety made all the more popular because it is the only major variety of the Barber dime series. While the finest example is a single PCGS graded MS66, a circulated example can be had for as little as \$95 in good condition up to \$400 in very fine condition (and that is for slabbed coins).

If anyone in the club happens to have one of these, perhaps you can bring it to the January club meeting as a show and tell!



HISTORY CORNER

(One Hundred Years Ago – December 1925)

The tögrög (Mongolian: प्राप्त төгрөг, also spelt tugrug or tugrik, is the official currency of Mongolia. It was historically subdivided into 100 möngö (тыся мөнгө). Currently, the lowest denomination in regular use is the 10-tögrög note, and the highest is the 20,000-tögrög note.

The word *tögrög* refers to 'circle' or 'circular object' (i.e., a coin). Today, it is rarely used outside of referring to the currency, with the exception of the phrase *tögrög sar* (төгрөг cap), meaning 'full moon'.



Mongolia, with the support of Russia, proclaimed their independence from China and on March 13, 1921 a Provisional People's Government was established and later, on November 26, 1924 the government proclaimed the Mongolian People's Republic.

The tögrög was introduced on December 9, 1925 at a value equal to one Soviet ruble, where one ruble or tögrög was equal to 18 grams (0.58 oz.) of silver. The coinage of 1925 consisted of 1, 2, and 5 möngö copper coins, and 10, 15, 20, 50 möngö and 1 tögrög silver coins. It replaced the Mongolian dollar and other currencies and became the sole legal currency on April 1, 1928.

Möngö coins are no longer in circulation as currency, owing to their negligible value. Today, they are sold online and to tourists as collectibles.

During socialism, the tögrög coin denominations were 1, 2, 5, 10, 15, 20, 50 möngö, and 1 tögrög. After the Mongolian People's Republic came to an end in 1992 and inflation surged, möngö coins were abandoned and larger tögrög values were introduced.

The coins of 1925 are readily available, mostly costing tens of dollars. Only for high grade issues would you expect to pay more than \$100 for a coin, thus putting these within reach of most collectors.
